

What is Holmes Chapel Partnership?

The Partnership is a voluntary organisation which aims to both facilitate projects of benefit to the local community and promote the village – of which we are justly proud - to the wider community.

The group was formed in 2010 following the publication of the Holmes Chapel Parish Plan, with the initial aim of implementing as many of the major actions identified in the Plan as possible; it is a member of the Towns Partnership (which includes the Alsager, Congleton, Middlewich, Poynton and Sandbach Partnerships), allowing it to both benefit from the experience of similar groups and share its own successes.

The members of the Partnership are all volunteers, including residents and representatives from local schools, Holmes Chapel Parish and Cheshire East Councils and Everybody Sport & Recreation. Committee meetings are held monthly, (normally) on the 4th Wednesday – anyone is welcome to attend.

Holmes Chapel Partnership Projects and Events

Since its inception the Partnership has worked hard to make Holmes Chapel a great place to live for the local community. Working alone and with other groups it has completed a number of major projects since 2010, most of which originated from actions identified in the Parish Plan; to date, the Partnership has raised well over £300,000 in grant funding to help fund the projects.

Refurbishment of Village Play Areas

Starting with the play area in Middlewich Road, and working with the Parish Council, the Partnership took on the task of raising funds for and refurbishing the play area – originally provided by the Parish Council - adjacent to Holmes Chapel Primary School. The project took about 18 months from the formation of the working group which managed the process to the opening of the new play area in July 2013 by the Mayor of Cheshire East, Dorothy Flood.





Following the success of the Middlewich Road project, the working group moved on to refurbish the play area behind Elm Drive, which had originally been provided by the Elm Drive developers. Again, the project took about 18 months to complete, and the new play area was opened in July 2015 by local MP, Fiona Bruce.

Dane Meadow Improvements

The Dane Meadow is a recreation area in the northwest corner of the village. It had become very untidy and was used mainly by dog walkers and fishermen; in particular the steps down from Bramhall Drive and Moreton Drive had become dangerous.

In the Autumn of 2011 the Parish Council set up a joint project with the Partnership to improve the area, creating a bridleway, new ponds and nature areas and improving access (including special access and parking for disabled persons).



After a lot of hard work by everyone involved the much improved area was opened by Fiona Bruce, MP, in May 2014.

SECTION 1: HOLMES CHAPEL PARTNERSHIP

Health & Wellbeing Projects

Holmes Chapel Partnership is passionate about the Health & Wellbeing of the local community:

Cycling Village / Walking

Over the years the Partnership has researched and created a number of maps – for the local community and visitors – to promote cycling and walking. These include a set of suggested cycling routes in the village (avoiding main roads where possible), leisure cycling routes outside the village, and most recently walking routes.

Dementia Friendly Village

Dementia is a disease that is affecting more and more people throughout the world. Following guidance from the Alzheimer's Society, many communities across the UK are becoming Dementia Friendly.

In 2017 the Partnership decided to start a project to make the local community – residents, organisations, and businesses – aware of the challenges of Living with Dementia, and create a Dementia Friendly village. Having made the decision to become a Dementia Friendly Church, the Methodist Church established a Memory Café, and the Partnership is proud to support their work.

Sensory Garden

At the time of publication, the Partnership is involved in a project with the Village Volunteers to create a Sensory Garden in the area adjacent to the 'chit chat' benches (between the entrance roads to the Fire Station and the shopping precinct). It is envisaged that this will provide a restful area, full of colourful and scented flowers, shrubs and trees.

Regular Village Events

Village Fair (July)

The Village Fair has been run for many years by the Victoria Club on the sports field behind the club house. It was originally run on the Spring Bank Holiday weekend at the beginning of May, but in 2016 the decision was taken to move it to July due to poor weather causing problems on the field. Each year there are a variety of stalls, a funfair, food and drink stalls and entertainment.

<u>Celebrating Holmes Chapel (September)</u>

This is a new event started by Holmes Chapel Partnership in 2017, and is a combination of a showcase for local groups and organisations and a traditional village show; the first event also included a Classic Car Show. The event takes place at the Community Centre.



Regular Village Events (continued)

Fireworks Display (November)

The traditional Fireworks display is run each year by the Victoria Club, and is very popular. As well as the fireworks, there is food and drink available at the event, which takes place on the club's sports field.

Remembrance Parade (November)

The local branch of the Royal British Legion organises a well-attended Remembrance Parade each year which makes its way to St. Luke's Church for the Remembrance service.

Christmas Market (December)

Holmes Chapel Partnership established the village's first Christmas Market in 2012, which took place in the car park at the rear of the Co-op supermarket. There was a good number of stalls, some run by local groups and charities, selling gifts, food and drink; entertainment was provided by local school children, dancers, and singers, and the event was compered by Chris Appleton. The Market is now a well-established event, run by the Partnership, and takes place on the first Sunday of December; each year it has got bigger and better and it has reached the point where there is a waiting list for stalls.



Christmas Eve Community Carol Singing



Father Christmas Sleigh

More volunteers are needed, individuals and organisations, to accompany Father Christmas on an evening rota basis. Donations are collected and shared between local charity organisations.

SECTION 3: HISTORY OF THE VILLAGE

A Brief History of Holmes Chapel

Holmes Chapel village centre is about a mile from Junction 18 on the M6, 20 miles north of Stoke on Trent and 25 miles south of Manchester. Originally on a drovers' route and then coaching routes it was a farming community which had strong transport links with surrounding towns. These links were further enhanced by the coming of the railways and more recently the M6. The impact on Holmes Chapel has been a growth from about 400 residents in the early 1800s to over 6000 now, and most of that growth has occurred since the 1950s and continues to this day.

Holmes Chapel is still quite compact and green fields can be reached within a mile of the centre in any direction. Furthermore it has retained its character as a village with a central parish church, several pubs and a good range of private shops.

Although surrounded by mixed farms there have been manufacturing industries in Holmes Chapel for a long time. There is evidence of early iron manufacturing in the area and more recent industries have been wallpaper and pharmaceuticals production. In the 1930s Benger's Food Company moved to Holmes Chapel from Manchester. The old buildings have now been demolished and the site is designated for commercial use and housing. Sanofi Aventis is still operating pharmaceuticals production from an adjacent site and will be expanding its operation over the next 5 years.

With good transport links it is not surprising that Holmes Chapel has grown rapidly, especially from 1970. Several modern housing estates have been developed around the centre along with the building of a secondary school, now Holmes Chapel Comprehensive School, medical facilities (a central Health Centre) and an extended public library.

In its infancy the village was known as Church Hulme but has also been known as Hulmes Chapel. Today the name Church Hulme is mainly used for the ecclesiastical Parish of Church Hulme, made up of the townships of Holmes Chapel, Cranage and Cotton.

A chapel has been a feature of the village since earliest times with a church present on the site from at least the 13th century when it was a chapel of ease to the mother church in Sandbach. The Parish Registers date from 1613 and some Bishops Transcripts from 1597. The village built up around the cross roads and the church, forming The Square which was a focal point of the village with many social functions including fairs and a cattle market. That is how it remained for many years with gradual development along the four arms of the crossroads.

In 1753 the village consisted of nineteen buildings, but in July of that year fifteen were destroyed by fire; the Church, the Old Red Lion and two cottages survived. Hence, most of the village buildings are no older than the 18th century.

The Old Red Lion dates from the 17th century (if not before), the earliest documentary evidence found being the will and inventory of Thomas Gandie dated 1625. Many travellers rested here with stage coaches calling daily. In 1738 John Wesley paid his first visit to Holmes Chapel whilst on route from Oxford to Manchester. He rested and preached a sermon at the Red Lion Inn.

Much of the development after the fire was paid for by the principal land owners, the Hall family, who lived at The Hermitage. Several buildings around Holmes Chapel can be seen with a stone showing TBH and a date. T.B.H. was the initials of Thomas Bayley Hall, the last member of the Hall family at The Hermitage. Thomas Bayley Hall's estates were sold to various people after his death in 1828.

A forge was established by 1840 although the site is now run by the Dale family as an agricultural engineers and farm supplier's store. Other family businesses which have existed for many generations include Mandeville's bakery (est. 1900) and Morrey's general hardware store (1850). Morrey's relocated to Manor Lane in 2014 and a Sainsbury's Local and Costa Coffee shops now occupy the original site.

The Square was bounded by the Bulls Head (demolished in 1948) and the old George and Dragon, which was demolished and rebuilt in its current location in 1970 to make way for the widening of Middlewich and Knutsford Roads.

The early history of St Luke's Church in Holmes Chapel is not clear, but there is a possibility that the site where the church now stands was a place of pagan worship before a church was built. The earliest indication of there being a church is 1265 when the abbot of Dieulacres Abbey near Leek gave permission to the abbot of Chester for services to be held in the "Chappell at Church Hulme". We don't know what that church looked like but as Holmes Chapel was even then at a busy North-South and East-West cross roads perhaps we should not be surprised that funding was provided for a new church in the 1430s. We believe this was donated by the Needham family who came from Derbyshire and settled in Cranage. The church they built would have been black and white timber framed building, a bit smaller than now but with the tower and wonderful vaulted roof as we see to this day. The church used to have tombs and stained glass in memory of the Needham family but they have all vanished.




During the Civil War there was a skirmish between Royalist and Parliamentary soldiers on 26th December 1643 and shots were fired from approximately where Barclays Bank is now. Two men were killed. You can see musket ball marks on the North face of the tower to this day, which are strongly believed to be as a result of the skirmish.

The Conservation Area

The centre of the village of Holmes Chapel, around the Parish Church of St. Luke's, was designated a Conservation Area on 12th February 1974. The area is bounded by Middlewich Road and Macclesfield Road to the North and Parkway to the South.

The historic heart of the village contains a range of interesting buildings as well as the church, all with their own story to tell. The more we make people aware of the area and improve its attractiveness the more it will be valued by the community. Holmes Chapel Parish



Council, working with the Local History Group of the Holmes Chapel U3A, have recently started a programme of work to improve and raise awareness of the Conservation Area in the village.

Firstly they plan to add four interpretation panels around the area to explain a little about the history of the village. They recently received a grant from the Co-op in the village and the panels are expected to be in place by the Summer of 2018.

Next it is planned to add street signs in a heritage style. The village centre is surprisingly lacking in signs so we hope they will be useful as well as attractive features, whilst further defining the location of the Conservation Area.

The Parish Council is also circulating businesses in the area, with the aim of working together to improve the overall appearance of the area by ensuring all advertising signage works to the benefit of the business as well as enhancing the heritage character of the area.

Over the next few years the group plan to improve the appearance of a major walking route through the Conservation Area – Church Walk. Re-surfacing the path, adding new street furniture and lighting would make this an attractive route to some of our shops.

It is important that we preserve the historic heart of the village for the benefit of not only our own residents but also for visitors who will be encouraged to spend more time here and in so doing support the shops and keep the place a vibrant and attractive destination.

Holmes Chapel Parish Council

Parish Councils are the first tier of local government and the closest to the community they serve. They are elected bodies with statutory and discretionary powers and rights to represent their communities and provide services for them. The number of councillors is fixed by the local Borough or Unitary Council; in Holmes Chapel the Parish Council has 12 members who are elected by the community every 4 years.

The role of councillor involves attending meetings on about two Thursday evenings each month but those with time can get much more involved in the activities and promote what they believe would benefit the village. Each year they set a budget and raise funds (known as the precept) which are used to pay for the two Council staff, the office in Church Walk and to fund the activities which the council decides to carry out. The members are not paid and normally do not claim expenses.

The Parish Council is not 'party political' and people join the council to use their skills and knowledge to try and help improve our village. The current precept raised for the approximately 6000 residents is £209,000. So what is it spent on? The details can be found on the Parish Council web site www.holmeschapelparishcouncil.gov.uk but below are some of the achievements from the last few years, sometimes supported by other groups in the village and by further grants:

- Re-paving the original tarmac footpaths in the village centre with stone pavements
- Developing an area of land owned by CEC into the Dane Meadow our own country park
- Upgrading the Middlewich Road and Elm Drive Play Areas
- Purchasing the Holmes Chapel Community Centre site, upgrading the facilities and working with Everybody Sport & Recreation who now run the successful leisure club
- Working with the community to produce our own Neighbourhood Plan
- Improving the footpath along the River Croco

The Council works with other voluntary groups such as the Village Volunteers, the Holmes Chapel Partnership and Holmes Chapel U3A, and also builds relationships with Cheshire East Council to provide local knowledge about issues such as highways for which they are responsible.

Much work has been done recently reviewing the large number of planning applications relating to new housing in the area. The Parish Council is consulted about such matters but it is Cheshire East Council which makes the decisions and even they are over-ruled sometimes. Our efforts are to look at the detail using our local knowledge. We were able to ensure the planned T junction at the south end of Manor Lane was changed to a roundabout. We work hard to ensure any funds from developers (known as \$106 money) are used to support local infrastructure and we are developing a vision of how we would like to see Holmes Chapel develop over the next 20 to 30 years.

If you have an interest in the village and have the time to spare why not talk to the Clerk to the Council or one of the councillors. You do not even need to wait to be elected as you can be co-opted on to a committee at any time.

I am PCSO Liz Chesters, and I am part of Sandbach Police Station. My main areas of responsibility are Dane Valley and Brereton Rural.

Originally from Crewe I moved to Sandbach in 2006 with my family. I have worked in previous customer service roles and managed a complaints team for a mobile networking company.



I have always been interested in the police, and in February 2017 I embarked on the application process to become a Police Community Support Officer as I decided it was time to dedicate myself in policing the communities of Cheshire. I have always had a passion for improving the quality of life for the public and therefore saw this as an opportunity to help others. As a resident close to the areas that I am responsible for, I am in tune and familiar with local people and local issues.

My main priority is to ensure the residents, businesses and visitors within the Holmes Chapel community have access to a good quality of life, and that means listening to, and acting upon, issues that are important to them.

With me being a new face to Holmes Chapel, I am also ensuring that I have a visible presence in the village and at local events. I think the presence of police in the village provides reassurance and allows local residents to have a point of contact.
