It may only be August but we've started planning the Holmes Chapel Christmas Market & Fair event already! We've already received enquiries for stalls so here's a quick update on what we know so far.



### **Speedwatch Day of Action**

#### Friday July 11th was Cheshire Police Speedwatch Day of Action

PCSO Pam Graham informed us of this Cheshire wide Day of Action and asked us not just to note the vehicles exceeding the speed limit but provide the number of vehicles which passed along the road during the monitoring period. Our team concentrates on Macclesfield Road because Holmes Chapel Partnership is campaigning to have a crossing installed so that parents and children who live east of the railway line and those on the Victoria Mills estate can safely cross the road to get to The Hermitage Primary School.

These were the questions Cheshire Police wanted an answer to:

- Did you deploy on Friday 11th? Yes.
- How many volunteers did your group put out? Three people
- How many hours did you deploy as a group? 30 minutes between 8.30am and 9am when parents and children are going to school.
- Total number of vehicles passing:
   During those 30 minutes there were 209 vehicles heading west towards the village centre and 144 heading out towards Manor Lane.
- How many vehicles at ACPO level of speeding (35mph or above)?
   Five vehicles recorded heading west. We don't have permission to record the speed of those heading east but from our observations the number would have been similar.

Considering that the road was so busy, the number of vehicles exceeding 35mph is surprising. As we have stated before, a bunch of vehicles can only go as fast as the leader of the pack and there are too many hazards on Macclesfield Road (parked cars, exits and entrances) to make overtaking a realistic option. One car was nevertheless recorded travelling at 42mph and a car towing a caravan seemed to think 35mph was okay!

The 30mph sign coming into Holmes Chapel before the roundabout is easy to overlook. There is no warning that it is a school route (despite our best efforts to get the sign restored!) There is however a Speed Indicator Device (SID) next to the entrance to the Victoria Mills estate which flashes to tell drivers if they are driving above the 30mph speed limit. The data from this SID shows that only approximately 40% of drivers keep to the 30mph speed limit.

Speedwatchers on a very sunny July 11<sup>th</sup>! Note the line of parked cars – an extra hazard for parents and children trying to cross the road.

#### **Active Travel**

Holmes Chapel is a large, compact village built on flat land overlooking the Dane Valley; it is essentially a collection of housing estates intersected by main roads. Most of the estates have a single road which serves as both the entrance and the exit, this means no rat runs. The estates approximate to what planners call Low Traffic Neighbourhoods (LTNs) and are desirable places to live.

The village should be a perfect location for **Active Travel** (moving around under your own steam), but not much of it seems to happen.

# Active Travel But NOT for Holmes Chapel



Don't worry, Cheshire East are on the ball. They have launched their "**Active Travel Consultation**" which describes their vision for the future, and tells us all the benefits we are going to enjoy. Easy, safe movement around the village, less pollution, better health, more parking spaces, fewer potholes, the list can go on forever.

Unfortunately **it does not apply to Holmes Chapel**, only towns with a population greater than ten thousand.

So we pay our local and national taxes, Cheshire East say "Active Travel is Important to us", but Holmes Chapel gets no benefit. In the meantime we have to live in a village where kids cannot safely walk or cycle to school, Aldi is inaccessible for mobility scooter users, and for many people just walking around the village is an unpleasant experience.





# Show Results 2025: The 200th Holmes Chapel Gooseberry Show!

The Gooseberry Association Show was held at the Victoria Club on Saturday 26th July. To celebrate the bicentenary the Show moved into the Hall so that more people could take part in this historic occasion! It was even filmed by the BBC and appeared on North West Tonight in their evening news bulletins!



The aim is to grow the heaviest berries. The first place in the Premier Berry competition was taken again by Kevin Staton with a berry that weighed in at just over 28 pennyweights. Chairman, David Monks came in second and Hazel Sutcliffe was 3rd. Last year the heaviest berry was 22 pennyweights because of the cold wet spring. This year brought new challenges for Gooseberry

Growers - a dry and sunny spring and three heatwaves. You are only allowed to pick your berries the day before the competition so there was a lot of disappointment amongst the 11 growers that their prize berries had dropped off in the last two or three weeks or the wasps had got them or they had split open they were so ripe - there are many hazards!

#### Quest for heaviest gooseberry celebrates 200 years

This year marks the Cheshire village's bicentennial gooseberry fair, at which contestants compete for the prized "premier berry" award, bestowed upon the grower of the most weighty fruit.



At its peak, the prize was the equivalent of a month's wages but organisers now describe it as just "a quirky and frivolous activity".

Holmes Chapel Gooseberry Society vice secretary Andy Anderson said: "If you look back at what's happened over the last 200 years - all the different world events - people have got together on the last weekend in July and weighed off some gooseberries and had a few beers."

### **Rose Day in Goostrey**

This year marked the 120<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Goostrey's Rose Day Festival and the sun was shining for all those who attended.

The colourful procession included a traction engine, vintage tractors and horse drawn carriages. For this year's Rose Day Festival, 12-year-old Rosa Tomlinson, a pupil at Holmes Chapel Comprehensive School, was crowned Goostrey Rose Queen.

More than 30 floats took part as hundreds of spectators turned out to watch the annual procession, which has been running since 1905. Goostrey schoolchildren took part in entertaining the crowd with maypole dancing followed by a performance from the Batida Rio Samba Band.

Towards the end of the procession, the Rose Queen laid flowers at the war memorial before she was crowned. This year, the Gold Queen was Nicci Chapman, who was crowned in 1975 and the Silver Queen was Rachel Watmore, who was Rose Queen in 2000.

For the first time in its 120-year history Rose Day has joint presidents, Andy and Alison Gill, who were supporters of the organising committee for around 20 years. The festival started in 1905 and thanks to the support of villagers, the annual tradition is still going strong and continues to attract hundreds of villagers each year.

Awards were given for the floats which took part in the procession. David Attenborough's endangered species float took the Jon Lee Cup for the best children's float and best banner was awarded to the circus float. Just Another Float by the Kettlewell family won best adult float and Dave Park and Paul Chaisty from the Gooseberry Society shared the Mrs Kettle Trophy for the best adult fancy dress.

### East Cheshire Hospice Launches Appeal for New Beds



East Cheshire Hospice has launched a Bed Appeal to provide patients with new specialist beds. The charity is hoping the community will respond to a plea for help to replace 16 much-needed beds at a total cost of £95.648.

Claire Barber, the Hospice's Clinical Services Manager, explains:

"I'm making a heartfelt appeal – one that lies at the very core of the care we provide.

"After 10 years of constant use, our specialist beds and mattresses, despite regular servicing, are no longer as safe and comfortable as we want them to be. We desperately need to replace them to continue offering the first-class compassionate care that every person deserves.

"These beds are the most vital piece of equipment in end-of-life care. They bring comfort, dignity and safety to those at their most vulnerable. The specialist mattresses help prevent bedsores by reducing pressure points. The adjustable bed helps patients find the most comfortable and supportive position and helps nurses reposition patients to relieve pain and manage breathlessness.

"These beds also make it possible for patients to feel more at home and more connected with their loved ones. A fully adjustable bed means patients can chat face-to-face with their loved ones. Lowering the side rails makes it easier to hold hands with someone dear. The beds are also easy to move and steer so patients in bed can still enjoy being in the garden or spending time in the Family Room. They truly are so much more than just a bed."

All 15 beds in the Inpatient unit need to be replaced, along with another in the Sunflower Living Well Centre. Each bed costs £5,978.

The charity is asking schools, businesses, families and individuals to donate and support a fundraising campaign. ### **Stroke Survivors Group**

After our CEO Liz Bedson's father survived a stroke in 2016 it was evident that there was a need for stroke survivors to be supported. After leaving hospital in Cheshire East stroke survivors receive relevant therapies to support them: Occupational Therapy, Physiotherapy and Speech & Language Therapy. However this is only for a 16-week period. After that these resources are cut off, and they are left to 'fend for themselves'. This is the point at which they are at their most vulnerable. We hear this all the time from the stroke survivors who attend our groups and is the reason why we founded the Stroke Survivors organisation.

We currently operate our face to face groups in Crewe, Sandbach, Alsager and Nantwich and we are now coming to support stroke survivors in Holmes Chapel. CEO Liz Bedson said "By empowering stroke survivors to recover, reclaim and rebuild their lives after a stroke, we build motivation and resilience and reduce social isolation for them in a fun and positive manner. ### One You Cheshire East

### Are you a smoker, looking for support to be smoke free? Why not try Swap to Stop with One You Cheshire East?

Introduced by the Government in April 2023, Swap to Stop encourages adult smokers to switch from smoking tobacco products to vaping as a transitionary step to quitting smoking.

The aim of this scheme is to reduce smoking rates and promote better health outcomes for smokers. Vaping is considered a less harmful choice than smoking, and a tool that can be used short term to help existing smokers stop tobacco use.

### Fast Selling Tickets for Goosfest 2025

This year's Goosfest Box Office opened with a flourish last month (July) - and tickets have been selling well ever since.

Some events sold out on the first day, but there are still plenty of events with availability so it's best to check through the website – Goosfest.com – and see what's still open for booking.

This year's festival spans an arts and crafts weekend at the end of September, followed by a 10-day festival of music, drama, comedy and other entertainment during the first two weeks in October. The Arts Weekend features an impressive display of



professional artists in Orchards Barn, Bidlea Dairy, from Friday September 26<sup>th</sup> to Sunday 28<sup>th</sup>. 'Art in the Barn' includes the work of more than 20 artists plus a shop featuring prints, cards and other gifts. The weekend also hosts art workshops and demonstrations, either at the barn or Cheshire Clay Studios at Lowe's Farm Shop. See Goosfest.com for any workshop availability.

During the September Arts weekend, Goostrey Archives is planning an exhibition about the history of Goostrey's two pubs, from 10am to 4pm on Saturday 27<sup>th</sup> September at both The Crown and The Space Invader. And for train buffs, Friends of Goostrey Station (FOGS) are organising a Saturday morning display at the station to celebrate the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the modern railway. There's also pétanque (French boules) sessions on the pétanque court at Bidlea Dairy on Saturday September 27<sup>th</sup>, and the weekend closes with a Goosfest/St Luke's Church concert by Biddulph Male Voice Choir at 4pm in the Parish Church. Later that week, on Thursday evening, October 2<sup>nd</sup>, there's a demonstration and workshop about Mozzarella cheese making at Bidlea Dairy Café.

The main arts and music festival begins on Friday October 3<sup>rd</sup>, and spans 10 days until October 12<sup>th</sup>. Please check event availability on the website – Goosfest.com – and book online.

### Holmes Chapel Railway Station Corner by Tony Wright - July 2025




No trains to or from Stockport Railway Station from Saturday 2nd August until Friday 22nd August 2025!

No trains will run through Stockport Railway Station while Network Rail undertakes significant improvement work to replace the Greek Street roundabout bridge.

The following options are available to help you continue your journey during this time:

- Rail Replacement Buses: Both express and stopping services will operate on routes serving Stockport.
- Diverted Long-Distance Trains: Some long-distance trains will be diverted and may use alternative routes in and out of Manchester.
- Ticket Acceptance: Tickets will also be accepted on selected Bee Network bus and tram services across Greater Manchester.

Further improvement work is planned for October and Christmas 2025, with the final phase scheduled for Spring 2026, when the road and roundabout will reopen.



The main advice given is to allow extra time and check before you travel: northernrailway.co.uk or nationalrail.co.uk

I travel regularly between Holmes Chapel Railway Station and Manchester Piccadilly Railway Station. During the Stockport closure there is still an hourly train service for this route at the new time of 24 minutes past the hour - a one hour journey-time direct service via Manchester Airport (or leave the train at Alderley Edge or Wilmslow and catch the Transport for Wales service to Manchester Piccadilly - total journey time 49/50 minutes).


