#### Walk to School Event Postponed until Thurs 6th June

This was the forecast on Wednesday 22nd May

Amber warning of rain Starts: 12:00 BST on Wed 22 May Ends: 12:00 BST on Thu 23 May



Station Road at 8.30am on Thursday 23rd May

Rain will become heavy and persistent later Wednesday and Thursday with flooding and disruption likely.

We conducted a Close Pass Operation today in Holmes Chapel.



A PC in plain clothes rides a bicycle and with her hidden radio she communicates to patrol officers who can then help pull in drivers who have driven too close to our cyclist and we can then give advice on best practice.

I organised this event with PC Spencer from our Roads and Crime Unit and also a Fire Safety Officer. My colleagues from Sandbach Neighbourhood Policing Team and a fellow PCSO.

Together we spoke to drivers, cyclists and pedestrians to raise awareness on #RoadSafety.

Local cycling campaigner Roy Hayhurst, commented:

"The first Close Pass Operation in November got more negative comments on the Village Facebook Pages than positive ones. This time there were no negative comments, maybe because residents are accepting it as a standard road safety procedure. Conversations within the local cycling community over the weekend reflected that from a cyclist's perspective it is without exception a highly valued operation,"

Our local PCSO Pam Graham declared herself to be well satisfied with the outcome. The Police engaged with two cyclists, seven drivers and 25 pedestrians. She said: "This is less about numbers but about engagement and advising people on best practice".

PC Lee Spencer reported: "From the responses we received on the ground, we were pleased with how it went and we will be looking at running more events. From social media comments it would appear that horse riders have similar problems to cyclists and would like to have a similar initiative. We have run Close Pass events specifically for horses in Cheshire, but we are limited as we must bring in horses and riders from Merseyside Police."

#### Holmes Chapel Partnership's Harry's Village Tours train the Official Guides



Our team of Tour Guides appointed in April turned out for a training day on Saturday 25th May.

The day started—as the tour will - at Holmes Chapel Station, where all the guides met up with the Partnership team, met Graham Blake and viewed his Harry Visitor Book. They then walked to Sam Dale's where they had a briefing from Peter Whiers, Chair of the

Partnership and got their kit. Mandie Maddocks of Dale's

has sourced the outfits: a pink tour guide cap and hi-vis vests. The tour participants will wear blue hi-vis vests. These are apparently Harry's favourite colours! They also received a Tour T shirt which will be available to purchase from Dale's as well as online, along with a key ring.



The group then visited Mandeville's and were introduced to the owner, Simon Wakefield, but did not stop to take photos of themselves with the image of Harry, as tour participants will no doubt want to do!

Thankfully Saturday turned out to be a sunny day, so it was then a pleasant walk to Twemlow Viaduct - the safe way down Hermitage Lane, across the old bridge, following the public footpath alongside the River Dane. The walking poles which will be available to tour participants to navigate the trickier parts of the route were not really necessary on this occasion.

In order to discourage Harry fans from writing their messages on the pillars of the viaduct (which is actually a criminal offence as it is a Grade 2 listed structure) we are providing tour participants with slate hearts on which they can write their messages to Harry and leave them at the foot of the pillar. The Tour Guides wrote their own messages as a demonstration. The kit provided for the Tour Guides includes a First Aid kit and also plastic bags to collect and remove any rubbish left behind by less respectful fans, as litter is one of the major concerns of the landowners. We picked up several items of rubbish on this occasion.



The group then walked back to Dale's to return their hi-vis vests and walking poles and to pick up their belongings - as the groups will do - and adjourned to Miola's for well-earned sandwiches.

We are producing a special map available only to tour participants. To those in possession of this map many of the village's businesses will be making special offers to encourage them to spend their money in Holmes Chapel! We also want to give the fans an insight into

the life and history of our village - the place their idol spent his formative years. The first tour is planned for June 8th.

#### Home Grown in Holmes Chapel

On Saturday 18<sup>th</sup> May we had Home Grown in Holmes Chapel's annual Plant swap. As always, the plants were free and you didn't have to bring any plants to swap, although that always helps. It was held outside the Health Centre, starting at 10 am.



I was determined to take loads of photos this time, as a record of a great event. However, even as we were putting up the tables, people were arriving to see what plants



were available. So I quickly forgot about photos and helped people to choose the best plants for their plots.

Lots of people turned up over the next two hours. Many brought plants they had grown to swap. Our brilliant supporters brought kale, lettuce, fennel and cabbage plants, along with cosmos, geraniums, crocosmia and dahlias for the garden. Others came with strawberry plants and chillies. One person even brought a small tree.

We had lots of healthy tomato plants, along with "Money Maker" and "Gardeners Delight" there were unusual varieties like "Bloody Butcher", "Black Cherry" and "San Mazarno". There were several aubergine "Black Beauty" plants, as well as gourds, cucumber and courgette plants.

Many of our visitors wanted some help with growing issues from their own plot. They looked at our raised beds, especially at our onions and broad beans and were astonished to find out that both of these vegetables were planted in October. No wonder their own broad beans never come to much as they only go in the ground in April.

Several people mentioned that they follow us on Facebook at Home Grown in Holmes Chapel to find out what we are planting. We do try to make sure as many people as possible know about our digs and events and Facebook is good for this. We also have a poster on the Fire Station notice board and in Tesco. So check these places out for information.

We also had some plastic pots that people could take to pot on their new vegetables. At each dig we try to have some used plant pots as this helps to stop them going to landfill.

Our next dig is on 1<sup>st</sup> June and we will have a stall at the Village Fair on 7<sup>th</sup> July.

#### **Bear Town Challenge**

## Congleton Chronicle Report dated 15 April 1620 - as Imagined by Marianne Tomkinson of the u3a Creative Writing Group

Last Thursday 8 April 1620, John Smith, Innkeeper at the Lion and Swan in Congleton, convened an emergency meeting of the local Society of Innkeepers to address the pressing issue of the lack of a Bear for this year's Wakes in May.



Mr Smith, age 45, said "Following the sad death of 30-year old Boris, the town's unvanquished dancing Black Bear, late last month, a successor is urgently required to lead this year's festivities."

Alderman Williams reported that he had located a possible candidate from Chester, a five year old fighting bear at a price of sixteen shillings. He opined: "This would be an astute investment for Congleton and would require a contribution of only 1 shilling each from all 16 innkeepers in the town."

John Smith protested vehemently against this suggestion, describing such a levy as "a punitive penalty on all Alehouses, Taverns and Inns in the town," as a shilling would be half a year's profit for his inn, and no doubt more for smaller taverns. He put forward a counterproposal to fund the purchase of a new bear - to use a proportion of the church's bible fund as an asset against which a loan could be taken out.

Rev Charles Walton, the Rector of St James' church, objected and declared that the bible fund represented the culmination of 10 years' fundraising and benefactors' donations from all 3 churches in Congleton, and should remain sacrosanct.

Mr Smith rebutted this argument and opined that the investment in the new bear would pay for itself in 5 years by increasing visitor numbers and the average spend at the annual Wakes, and the bible fund could be replenished to buy a new bible in 5 years' time.

The proposal was put to the vote, with 17 votes cast in favour and 1 against. Reverend Walton resigned that same day.

Mr Smith concluded: "Our Society agreed upon a very practical solution on how to fund a replacement bear, and Bosley, our new Black Bear, will be arriving in Congleton in good time for this year's Wakes."
