It has been an amazing year for fruit - there have been the apples in the Home Grown orchard, crab apples by the former Bird Hide and a magnificent crop of sloes (see photo) on the trees planted on the slope behind the pond—sloe gin, anyone?





A few weeks ago now a new bench was installed in the Dane Meadow. It was donated by her family in memory of Imagen Tothill who died tragically young. It looks out onto the river and the woods (see photo right) and is the perfect spot for some peaceful contemplation.

Celebrating 10 years of the Holmes Chapel Community Centre



We are delighted that this year marks 10 years since the Parish Council bought the Community Centre on behalf of our residents and signed an agreement with Everybody Health and Leisure (EHL) to operate it.

For the last 10 years the Parish Council and EHL have worked closely together to ensure the centre provides real community-based facilities alongside the gym and fitness classes.

It's not just a gym! The centre provides a wide range of opportunities for community use.

These opportunities include 'Stay and Play' for toddlers and guardians, Sport & Social for over 50s, a monthly Lunch Club offering a 2 course lunch with tea and coffee, and summer afternoon teas every month. The centre also offers health and lifestyle support through falls prevention and balance classes, mobility and strength classes, weight management and a healthy lifestyle programme, plus support to stop smoking. The site offers themed events such as Halloween Parties, Wreath Making sessions, monthly sound bath sessions, in addition to being able to hire out the meeting rooms for private events and celebrations. The skate park is also a great asset to the site.

We are delighted that Padel Courts will soon be installed at the site, which combined with refurbishment to the changing rooms will be a fantastic addition to the community centre offering.

Look out for exciting events to mark 10 years of the Community Centre and why not pop down and check out all it offers for yourself. The EHL staff are very friendly and only too willing to help.

Reclaim the Pavements

For the last two years the Parish Council has been running a campaign to 'Reclaim the Pavements' in Holmes Chapel. This involved walking the pavements of the village and looking for hedges, trees etc.... that are overgrown and impeding the footpaths

We wrote letters to households and contacted Cheshire East and other bodies, where vegetation was overtaking the pavements or blocking streetlights. We had some good results with many hedges and vegetation being cut back. A huge thank you to all those households who listened and acted on our concerns. Now the bird nesting season is over, it's a great time to cut back your hedges and trees! Representatives from the Parish Council are once walking the streets and we will send letters to households where simply cutting back vegetation would make the pavements much more accessible to all residents. 
Background information

Active Travel Update

In our August edition Roy Hayhurst wrote an article about the Active Travel Consultation carried out by Cheshire East Highways and encouraged people to respond and express their disappointment that we were being consulted about a policy for which Holmes Chapel would receive no funding and therefore nothing in the way of infrastructure to make it safer for residents to walk and cycle.



The sums involved:

- Cheshire East Council received significant grant funding, including over £2 million from Active Travel England's fund in 2023 and 2024
- £813,292 Consolidated Active Travel Fund allocation to support high-quality cycling and walking infrastructure.
- Additionally, community groups in <u>Crewe and Nantwich</u> can apply for grants of up to £9,999 to encourage walking and cycling for everyday travel, funded by the Department for Transport's Sustainable Travel Transition Year (STTY) scheme.


And this is where the money is being spent - or at least £1.3 million of it

Work started on **18 August 2025** to develop a new **1.5 mile** walking and cycling route between Wilmslow and Handforth.

As part of the scheme, CE Highways are:

- Installing a new segregated cycleway
- Installing two new toucan-controlled crossings for pedestrians and cyclists
- Improving Stanneylands Road junction including additional pedestrian crossing and a new cycle gate a feature used to separate the movements of bicycles and cars at busy junctions
- Introducing a bus stop bypass used to route walkers and cyclists behind the bus passenger boarding area
- Installing improved signage along the length of the route
- Reducing the speed limit from 40mph to 30mph

The work is being completed in phases and the initial phase of this project will take approximately 32 weeks to complete – diversion routes will be in place.



Congratulations to Handforth on getting this walking and cycling infrastructure for the benefit of their community – maybe we could get some tips on how to be successful in attracting funding to Holmes Chapel?

Active Travel Update cont...

In their responses to the Active Travel Consultation the Parish Council and Holmes Chapel Partnership provided a list of much less expensive projects – like reducing speed limits and a zebra crossing for Macclesfield Road. These would have a greater effect on a greater number of people than transforming at great cost a very short stretch of road into a walking and cycling paradise! By the way perhaps someone could report what happens at either end of this 'Walking and Cycling Eden'?

Congratulations also go to Brereton ...

... on getting these traffic calming measures as you approach Brereton village along School Lane. The fences indicate the beginning of a residential area and, as the name suggests, a Primary School. However a 30mph limit sign as well as the roundel painted on the road would be a useful addition?



The Parish Council has suggested a similar symbolic gateway for roads leading into Holmes Chapel – as yet to no avail.

Harry Styles is certainly taking active travel seriously!
He completed the Berlin Marathon in an amazing 2 hours
59 minutes and 13 seconds. A sub 3 hour marathon is
considered a landmark achievement for amateur runners.
He registered for the race under the name Sted Sarandos
and wore a head band and sunglasses in an attempt to
remain incognito – which he seems to have managed
– at least until the finish!



Safe Walking Routes to School - Campaign for a Crossing

In the September Newsletter we announced our intention to start a campaign to get a crossing on Macclesfield Road. We are putting together a dossier of evidence to support the need for a safe way to get across Macclesfield Road if you live east of the railway line or on the Victoria Mills estate.

This was our job list:

- We will be seeking the support of the Primary School.
- We will be conducting a pedestrian and vehicle count on Macclesfield Road at the start and end of school.
- The Speedwatch team will continue to monitor speeds.
- We will be collecting data from the Speed Indicator Device (SID).
- We want to create an online petition and short travel survey.

This is what we have achieved so far:

- $\sqrt{\ }$ We have the full backing of the new Headteacher at the Hermitage School, Adam Young.
- $\sqrt{}$ We have carried out the first pedestrian and vehicle count. Between 8.30 and 9am on Thursday 18th September 210 cars and 26 vans headed west and 167 cars plus 41 vans and a couple of HGVs headed east. Over 30 pedestrians half of whom were children scrambling to get across the road when there was a gap in the traffic.
- $\sqrt{\ }$ The Speedwatch team has been out and recorded a few vehicles travelling at 40mph during school run time.

- The SpeedWatch team will continue to monitor speeds on this road
- We will collect data from the Speed Indicator Device (SID)
- · We are collecting signatures from residents

Holmes Chapel Safe Spaces Update

Last month the Northwich Guardian reported the worrying details of two attempted abductions of teenagers on their way home from school.



Holmes Chapel Comprehensive swiftly contacted parents to alert them to this potential threat, including details of a similar situation at another local school.

In 2023, Holmes Chapel Partnership, supported by The Villages Mag, launched the 'Safe Spaces' scheme so anyone in Holmes Chapel who feels threatened, intimidated or in need of some adult support can seek help in several locations throughout our village. These locations all display the 'Safe Space' sticker in their window.

Anyone needing a safe space will be able to wait inside the location and, if needed, the adult there can make a call to a parent, carer or police.

Although nothing of this nature has been reported in Holmes Chapel, it's an important reminder that we should all be aware of potential dangers, particularly when interacting with strangers.

The High School outlined these guidelines for personal safety which can apply to all of us, not just children getting to and from school:

- Plan a Safe Route: choose a safe and well-lit route, avoiding isolated areas like alleys, parks, or quiet car parks
- Walk with Others: walk with a friend or in a group whenever possible
- **Stranger Danger:** Don't talk to or accept lifts or gifts from strangers. It's often recommended that parents and children have a "code word" for pick-ups
- What to Do if Unsafe: Trust your instincts. If you feel you are being followed; cross the road, move towards a busy area, and tell a trusted adult what is happening
- **Emergency Contacts:** Know how to contact parents or another trusted adult in an emergency. In case of immediate danger, know to call the police on 999
- Communicate Regularly: Maintain an open line of communication with your children, so they feel comfortable talking about any concerns they may have about their journey to school

Locations taking part in the Safe Spaces scheme include Holmes, Gifts & Interiors, Holmes Chapel Library, The Bottle Bank, Holmes Chapel Community Centre, Holmes Sweet Home, Sam Dale & Son, Phil Davies Butcher, A Stroke of Magic, Sandwiches Direct and Morrisons.

We welcome any commercial location to join the scheme. They must have public liability insurance and be open to the public.

We want everyone who lives in or visits our village; especially young people, vulnerable adults and anyone feeling generally unsafe, to know that they are not alone and that help is nearby.

Holmes Chapel Railway Station Corner by Tony Wright - Oct 2025




I am very pleased to share with you our Autumn bulb planting for the Spring showing in 2026!

I do hope that residents of Holmes Chapel and the many visitors using Holmes Chapel Railway Station notice our pocket gardens and planters on both the Crewe and Manchester platforms together with our various forms of artwork and displays.

In the Autumn of 2025 we are planting some 480 bulbs for the Spring 2026 display. The main flowers we hope to display are shown here.

We are aiming for 'Amber Azure' displays to provide an array of colour to Holmes Chapel Railway Station. The vibrant yellow miniature daffodils always offer a cheerful and warm welcome to Spring, perfectly contrasted by the deep, regal purple of the large flowering crocuses. We hope that adding the soft pink 'Glory-of-the Snow' showcases its charming blooms and the mixed dwarf Irises complete the displays with their intricate patterns and rich shades. I hope our efforts provide a floral display as the Winter chill of 2025 gives way to the warmth of Spring in 2026!



Crewe to Manchester Real Ale Trail Number 1

The Crewe to Manchester Community Rail Partnership are pleased to have launched the Crewe to Manchester Rail Ale Trail Number1!

After months of detailed discussions and background work the Rail Ale Trail is now up and running.

We are determined that the primary goals of the rail trail should be:

- To encourage train travel.
- To encourage patronage of local pubs and villages/towns.
- To offer enjoyment and entertainment to people ('a day out on the train').



Pubs in Handforth, Styal, Wilmslow, Alderley Edge, Chelford, Goostrey, **Holmes Chapel,** Sandbach, and Crewe are taking part. In **Holmes Chapel**: the **Beer Emporium**, the **Red Lion** and the **George and Dragon** are involved.

I have included the following information on the website about our village: Holmes Chapel Railway Station was opened on 10 May 1842. The village developed around the crossroads and the church, and now has a population of around 6,000. On 10 July 1753 there was a great fire; the church, some cottages and the Red Lion survived, but there is no record of any injuries or deaths.

Real Ale Trail cont...

The Square is the village focus, with shops and cafés and an annual Christmas Fair. The central hub is also a Conservation Area. St Luke's Church dates from the 1500s and has seven bells in total, six dating back to the early 1700s.

The Holmes Chapel Viaduct, spanning the Dane Valley, was completed by the Manchester and Birmingham Railway Company in 1841. It has 23 splendid brick arches, each with a span of approximately 60 feet.

Things to do in and around Holmes Chapel:

- walks around the village, along the Dane Valley, including to and from the viaduct, and also along the Dane Meadow via the Cranage Weir.
- a visit to the shops, bakery, cafés and library. a visit to the various sites associated with Harry Styles, including 'Harry's Wall' at the viaduct.

The idea is to enjoy a scenic day out on the train. Choose from over 20 pubs not far from the local railway station. 16 stickers can be collected in total for a free, branded baseball cap from the organisers. The trail is intended to be enjoyed at a leisurely pace and not all in one day. Advice is given to drink responsibly and respect fellow pub-goers, villagers, rail passengers and staff. There is no deadline to complete the trail. **Cheers!**





Wildflower Meadows in Cranage

Over the summer months, our dedicated *Friends of the Wildflower Meadows* volunteer group gathered every Monday evening over an eight-week period to help care for and protect our new meadow areas (see map). Their main task was the careful (and often onerous) removal of unwanted plants such as dock, thistle, and ragwort. While these species have their place in nature, in our meadows they can quickly take over, preventing more delicate wildflowers from flourishing. By removing them before they had a chance to set seed, our volunteers have helped prevent a much bigger problem in the years ahead.





The meadows are due to be cut for the season any day now, if they haven't been already. The hay will be left for a couple of weeks, giving seeds time to scatter before it is removed. Taking the hay away reduces soil fertility, which in turn helps wildflowers thrive by giving them a better chance to compete with more vigorous plants.

Looking ahead, we are excited about the next stage of development. We are planting around **2,500 plug plants** across the meadow areas to introduce new

species and strengthen those already present. This work will be carried out by the Cheshire Wildlife Trust, with valuable support from our own volunteer team.

In addition, our orchard fruit trees – which have been settling in nicely – will receive their annual pruning in November to help them grow strong and healthy in the years to come.

A heartfelt thank you goes to everyone who has contributed time, energy, and enthusiasm to this project. The meadows are already showing signs of becoming a wonderful haven for wildlife and a beautiful space for the community to enjoy.

38 Great North Runs!

The Great North Run is a half marathon, covering a distance of 13.1 miles (21.1 kilometres). The course begins in Newcastle, proceeds through Gateshead and South Tyneside, and concludes in South Shields. It attracts approximately 60,000 runners which makes it the biggest half marathon in the UK, if not the world. The first Great North Run was held in 1981 – 44 years ago – and Holmes Chapel resident Alex Davidson has run it 38 times which is some achievement!

Alex says "This year on September 7th was my thirty eighth Great North run. I was aiming to complete the run in 2hrs 30mins. The weather was warm but cloudy at times, with a nice breeze as I neared South Shields. The crowds were large and noisy, as they cheered us on. I eventually made



it to the finishing line in 2hrs 30 mins and 20 seconds, shame about the 20 seconds over my target!

I would like to thank everyone who supported me by giving to the Christy Charity, I have so far been able to collect over £790. I discovered through a running and church friend, Jill Booth, who also did the GNR, that there was a problem: the finisher's medal features a mis labelled map of Sunderland and the River Wear instead of the Tyne!"

News from FoGS

This year is the 200th anniversary of the birth of the modern railway. The Stockton and Darlington Railway opened on 27 September 1825 and the 26 mile journey, powered by Locomotion no 1, transformed how we travel. Throughout 2025 there are events to celebrate the past, present and



future of railways and to explore how this British invention has shaped our lives and our livelihoods. More information can be found on the Railway 200 website.

One example is Poet Laureate Simon Armitage's poem with the title The Longest Train In The World. Simon can be heard reading it on YouTube in a film made in Marsden, West Yorkshire where he grew up.

Locally there have been a variety of activities to mark the bicentenary. Goostrey Primary School pupils displayed work at our station about being transported to new places by art. The Footpaths group created two walks from Goostrey station, one to Chelford and one to Holmes Chapel, to support Railway 200's Walk for Rail Memories, a fund raising activity for Alzheimer's Research UK.

Friends of Goostrey Station organised an event during Goosfest. This included planting a tree, burying a time-capsule and sampling cupcakes with a Railway 200 logo. Over the summer, members had worked with Goostrey Parish Archive to create eight metal boards which record the history of our station in images and text. They were unveiled on the day. One focuses on the building that was on platform 2 from 1891 until it was removed in the 1960s. Another tells the story of the nationally important oil depot at Twemlow. Readers can learn more about the residents of station cottages. And they can find out about former employees like Joseph Harrop and Christopher Ashmore who worked as porters and signalmen. The boards are an excellent way to honour the past history of Goostrey station and to enrich the experience of passengers who use the Crewe-Manchester line.
